HEADQUARTERS AND HEADQUARTERS DETACHMENT 146th MEDICAL BATTALION

Organized by October 1860 in the Michigan State Troops at Ypsilanti as the Ypsilanti Light Guard

Reorganized and redesignated 25 April 1861 as Company H, 1st Infantry, Michigan Volunteers

Mustered into Federal service 1 May 1861 at Ypsilanti; mustered out of Federal service 9 July 1865

Reorganized and redesignated 19 May 1876 as Company F, 1st Infantry

Reorganized and redesignated 3 July 1885 as Company H, 4th Infantry

Reorganized and redesignated 19 January 1891 as Company G, 1st Infantry

(Michigan State Troops redesignated 31 December 1894 as the Michigan National Guard)

Mustered into Federal service 8-11 May 1898 at Island Lake as Company G, 31st Michigan Volunteer Infantry; mustered out of Federal service 17 May 1899 at Savannah, Georgia, and resumed state status as Company L, 1st Infantry

Converted and redesignated in May 1906 as Company A, Signal Corps

Mustered into Federal service 18 June 1916 as Company A, 1st Battalion, Signal Corps at Ypsilanti; mustered out of Federal service 21 March 1917

Called into Federal service 15 July 1917 at Ypsilanti; drafted into Federal service 5 August 1917

HEADQUARTERS AND HEADQUARTERS DETACHMENT 146th MEDICAL BATTALION

Reorganized and redesignated 20 October 1917 as Company A, 107th Field Signal Battalion and assigned to the 32d Division

Demobilized 17 May 1919 at Camp Grant, Illinois

Reorganized and Federally recognized 29 November 1920 at Ypsilanti as the 32d Signal Company, an element of the 32d Division

Inducted into Federal service 15 October 1940 at Ypsilanti

(Headquarters, 32d Division reorganized and redesignated 1 February 1942 as Headquarters, 32d Infantry Division)

Inactivated 28 February 1946 in Fukuka, Japan

Redesignated 1 July 1946 as the 46th Signal Company, an element of the 46th Infantry Division

Reorganized and Federally recognized 25 November 1946 in the Michigan National Guard

Reorganized and redesignated 15 March 1959 as Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 107th Signal Battalion, and relieved from assignment to the 46th Infantry Division

Reorganized and redesignated 15 March 1963 as Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, 107th Signal Battalion

Consolidated 1 February 1968 with Company C, 107th Signal Battalion (organized and Federally recognized 15 March 1963 at Ypsilanti) and consolidated unit designated as Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 156th Signal Battalion

Location changed 1 September 1989 to Belleville; on 1 October 1991 to Ypsilanti

Consolidated 1 September 2007 with Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, 146th Medical Battalion (see ANNEX), and consolidated unit designated as Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, 146th Medical Battalion

Organized and Federally recognized 1 September 2005 in the Michigan Army National Guard at Grand Ledge as Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, 146th Medical Battalion

Ordered into active Federal service 3 July 2006 at Grand Ledge; released from active Federal service 29 December 2007 and reverted to state control
