MEMORANDUM FOR Commanding General, Army Ground Forces, Room 25, Army War College.

Subject: Redesignation of Camp Hood, Texas

1. Reference is made to recommendation to the Chief of Staff in your memorandum of 1 August 1944 that Camp Hood, Texas, be redesignated as Fort McNair, Texas, in honor of the late Lieutenant General Lesley J. McNair, United States Army, which has been referred to this Office in accordance with Section II, WD Circular #127, 29 April 1942.

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2. Attention is invited to the comments of the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-3, 4 August 1944, and of the Chief of the Historical Section, Army War College, 10 August 1944.

3. The recommendation to redesignate Camp Hood, Texas, as Fort McNair, Texas, in honor of the late Lieutenant General Lesley J. McNair, United States Army, is not favorably considered at this time for the following reasons:

a. It is a temporary installation, which may or may not be retained in the post war period.

<u>b.</u> It is not of sufficient relative importance to be named in honor of the highest ranking officer of the Army of the United States ever to be killed in action.

<u>c.</u> It is not centrally located, as any memorial to an officer of General McNair's rank and prominence should be.

d. General McNair was not born in Texas, nor were his distinguished services particularly identified with that State.

e. General McNair's talents and accomplishments were not confined to the development of any one weapon or phase of troop training.

4. In this connection, it is desired that consideration be given to the suggestion that the site of the Army War College be designated as Fort McNair or the McNair Military Reservation for the following reasons:

a. It is a permanent installation and embodies other activities besides the college.

<u>b.</u> It was there that General McNair was stationed when he achieved his greatest success and fame as Commanding General of the Army Ground Forces.

<u>c</u>. The site is centrally located with reference to the entire country as well as the Army, and appears an especially appropriate place for perpetuating the name of General McNair.

d. The Army War College in peace time is the site of the most advanced school of military science in the United States, and it was from there that General McNair put into actual practice the doctrines taught and studied.

TO: The Adjutant General, Washington 25, D. C.

1. This headquarters renews, and strongly urges approval of its former recommendation that Camp Hood, Texas, be renamed Fort McNair, Texas.

a. Camp Hood is the outstanding post developed by the army in the present emergency. It comprises housing for 6,007 officers and 82,610 enlisted men, located on 158,578 acres of government-owned land, constructed and acquired at a cost of \$75,920,988. It is a post in which every type of unit in the Army Ground Forces can be trained and in which every Army Ground Forces weapon can be fired. This headquarters has recommended to the Deputy Chief of Staff, to the Chief, Special Planning Division, War Department Special Staff, and to the War Department Committee of officers to Review Requirements of the Army for Posts, Camps and Stations, that Camp Hood be retained and occupied in the postwar period. The Commanding General, Army Service Forces has recommended likewise. It is reasonable to assume that, if any of the new posts become permanent, Camp Hood will be included.

b. Relative importance of a post is a changing factor. Camp Hood is considered a major installation at this time. Its relative importance will increase as the less desirable facilities are eliminated.

c. Camp Hood is considered to be more centrally located with reference to the country as a whole and with respect to future military activity than is the Army War College.

d. Names with a local connotation normally are chosen in naming posts, but this policy does not prevail in the naming of outstanding posts in honor of persons of major military importance. It is noted that Camp Chaffee, Arkansas, was named for a native of Kansas, Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, for a native of New Hampshire, and Camp Gruber, Oklahoma, for a native of Ohio.

e. General McNair's great contribution was the integration of basic training of all arms and the development of combined

5. It is also desired that in the event it is not considered desirable to redesignate the site of the Army War College that consideration be given to the suggestion that whatever maneuver area may be selected as a permanent training theater of operations by the War Department board of officers appointed 3 May 1944, be named in honor of General McNair, bearing in mind the large part played by him in the development of combat troops through realistic maneuvers. However, while it is considered that it would be entirely appropriate to name for General McNair whatever maneuver area may be selected in the future, the time and location of its ultimate establishment are necessarily uncertain and subject to many considerations based on post war conditions, and might result in the indefinite postponement of doing honor to the memory of General McNair and its present morale value to the troops now in service be lost.

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6. It is considered highly desirable that some important, permanent, centrally located and appropriate military installation be named in honor of General McNair in order to perpetuate the memory of his outstanding services to the country in developing the largest, best trained and most adequately equipped force of ground combat troops in our history.

7. Your remarks and recommendations are requested.

training of all arms to a level not previously known in the United States Army. This headquarters regards Camp Hood as one of the posts best adapted to combined training.

2. This headquarters does not concur in the proposal to rename the Army War College in honor of General McNair.

a. While the Army War College is a permanent post, it is relatively insignificant and has no identity apart from the college itself. The other activities of the post (signal corps photographic laboratory and quartermaster sales commissary) add little.

b. While General McNair had his headquarters at the Army War College, he devoted the great part of his activities to the training camps. It would be a serious error to associate General McNair permanently with his office rather than with his troops. General McNair's association with the Army War College will be marked fittingly by the placing of a bronze plaque recently authorized by the Secretary of War.

c. This headquarters does not agree that the Army War College is centrally located with respect to either the entire country or the Army.

d. The status of the Army War College as a post in the postwar army is obscure. Presumably it will be occupied by the College if the College be re-established, or it might be occupied by the Army-Navy Staff College. In either event, General McNair's activities were far removed from classrooms.

e. The greatest objection to connecting General McNair's name to the Army War College post is that it is not possible effectively to rename this post. At the time of the establishment of the Army War College in 1901, the post was known as Washington Barracks. By 1927 the name Washington Barracks had disappeared entirely, and the War Department officially changed the name of the reservation to Army War College. In 1935 the War Department undertook to name the post Fort Humphreys. The last name never gained currency and in 1939 the name Army War College was restored. There is no reason to believe that name Fort McNair would achieve greater stability than Fort Humphreys.

3. The association of General McNair's name with the proposed training theater of operations is considered equally unsatisfactory.

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a. There is no certainty that such an area will be a part of the postwar military establishment.

b. Such a theater would be quite impermanent, with no great amount of improvements, and, occupying an exceedingly large area, the project is particularly vulnerable to political attack and partial dismemberment.

4. This headquarters agrees that it is highly desirable that some important, permanent, centrally located and appropriate military installation be named in honor of General McNair. Camp Hood is appropriate; it is well located with reference to future military activities; it probably will be permanent. It is desired to build a suitable memorial on the basis of the best of our new camps. General McNair often referred to Camp Hood as the best of our camps. He believed that it would be a major permanent post.

5. Reconsideration of action announced in basic communication is requested.

1. The CG, AGF, recommended to C of S, 1 Aug 44, that Camp Hood, Texas, be redesignated Fort McNair, Texas, in honor of Lesley J. McNair, late Lieutenant General, United States Army.

2. G-3 on 4 Aug 44, referred the recommendation from the CG, AGF to (1) Historical Section, AWC, for remark and recommendation, and (2) TAG for necessary action in accordance with Sec. II, WD Cir.127, 1942, suggesting two alternate possibilities, namely, that the site of the AWC, or the site of whatever future permanent maneuver area is established be named in honor of General McNair. The Historical Sec., AWC, recommended: (1) No change in Camp Hood, (2) No change in AWC, and (3) Future permanent maneuver training area be named for General McNair. The recommendation was returned to the CG, AGF, by TAG 15 Aug 44, suggesting that consideration be given to the two alternate possibilities mentioned by G-3. On 13 Sep 44 the CG, AGF, "renews and strongly urges" approval of his former recommendation.

3. The matter of changing the name of an established military post presents problems different from choosing a name for a new post or for a post not already named for a person. The War Department has previously expressed the opinion that having decided upon and announced a name, no change should be made except for a really vital reason, such as a duplication or confusion in names. When a name <u>is</u> announced it is recorded in many places in the War Department and noted by other Government agencies, such as the Post Office Department.

4. In this connection, Camp Hood, was so designated on 6 March 1942, by Sec. II WDGO No. 12, being named in honor of General John Bell Hood, Confederate States Army. It has been in use for over two years and is shown on page 578, Postal Guide, July 1943, as an independent branch Post Office of Killeen, Texas. A change will require amendment of many records and will probably result, temporarily at least, in some confusion in the delivery of mail, express, freight, etc. Under the present circumstances of war conditions, it is believed that such non-essential difficulties should be avoided.

5. At the time Camp Hood was established no living relatives of General Hood were located or notified, and it does not appear that any serious objections to the change in name are to be anticipated from that source. However, in view of former experiences in such matters which have involved the War Department in embarrassment, unfavorable criticism, and voluminous controversial correspondence from other sources it is believed to be inadvisable to change the name of Camp Hood at this time.

Paragraph 2c AR 210-10 provide that permanent posts be designated as "forts" and places occupied temporarily by troops as "camps". Paragraph 2a of the same regulations further provide that "permanent" military posts within the continental limits of the United States, including Alaska, be established only with express authority of Congress." In this connection the following is an opinion of The Judge Advocate General, 29 September 1942, on the subject of redesignating "camps" as" forts":

"It is the opinion of this office that unless Congress has specifically authorized the establishment of a permanent post at _____ or has otherwise indicated an intent that such post be established thereat, as for example, by appropriating funds for permanent improvements, the change in name from camp to fort would be in violation of the provisions of paragraph 2c AR 210-10, 20 December 1940, for the reason that the word "permanent" is used in that paragraph in the same sense as in paragraph 2a of the same regulations, i.e., to distinguish those "permanent" posts which have been established by express authority of Congress in conformity with the provisions of the Act of 2 March 1905 (33 stat. 836: 10 USC 1331) from such "temporary" reservations as may be acquired pursuant to general statutory authority. There would be no legal objection, however, to the waiver by the Secretary of War of the provisions of paragraph 2a AR 210-10, provided, of course, that the designation as a "fort" would not result in the mistaken assumption that the reservation is a permanent post which has been expressly recognized by Congress. It might be observed that such waiver might result in confusion as to the status of other posts; and for this reason it is recommended that the name be not changed to "Fort _____" in the absence of an Act of Congress clearly indicating an intent that the reservation be maintained as a permanent post."

7. To change the name of one camp would undoubtedly engender requests from communities and other sources for changes in names and designation as forts of other temporary camps.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That no change be made in the present designation of Camp Hood.

2. That until such time as it has been finally determined which of the many temporary camp sites occupied during the war are to become permanent posts, no such temporary camp be named in honor of General McNair.

3. This headquarters concurs in the recommendation of the Commanding General, Army Service Forces, that the name of Gen. MeNair should be with given a World War II Army Ground Forces installation.

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MEMORANDUM FOR THE CHIEF OF STAFF: Attention: Major Gordon F. Bell

SUBJECT: Redesignation of Camp Hood, Texas.

1. Reference is made to memorandum your office, dated 15 October 1945, WDCSA 352 Army War College (18 Sep 45).

2. Recommendations for the renaming of Camp Hood were not given favorable consideration at the time this matter was previously studied, for the following reasons:

a. Camp Hood is a temporary installation which may or may not be retained in the postwar establishment.

b. The camp was not then considered to be of sufficient relative importance to be named in honor of the highest ranking officer of the United States killed in action for many years.

c. The camp was not considered centrally located, as any memorial to an officer of General McNair's rank and prominence should be.

d. General McNair was not born in Texas, nor were his distinguished services particularly identified with that State.

e. It was considered that a change in the name of Camp Hood would have an undesirable popular and political repercussion in the State of Texas.
