Reorganized and redesignated 1 November 1943 as the 222d Replacement Company

Inactivated 17 September 1945 in France

Redesignated 17 May 1966 as the 222d Personnel Service Company and allotted to the Regular Army

Activated 1 August 1966 at Fort Bragg, North Carolina

Inactivated 6 February 1973 in Vietnam

Redesignated 1 October 1985 as the 502d Personnel Service Company and activated at Fort Hood, Texas

Reorganized and redesignated 16 October 1994 as the 502d Personnel Service Battalion

Reorganized and redesignated 16 April 2007 as the 502d Personnel Company
