423d MILITARY POLICE COMPANY

Constituted 4 July 1942 in the Army of the United States as the 260th Military Police Company

Activated 15 July 1942 at Camp Riley, Minnesota

Inactivated 15 January 1946 on New Caledonia

Redesignated 28 August 1950 as the 423d Military Police Escort Guard Company and allotted to the Organized Reserve Corps

Activated 1 October 1950 at Worcester, Massachusetts

Location changed 14 May 1951 to Long Island, New York; on 1 October 1951 to Plattsburg, New York

(Organized Reserve Corps redesignated 9 July 1952 as the Army Reserve)

Reorganized and redesignated 1 November 1952 as the 423d Military Police Company

Location changed 15 February 1955 to Mineola, New York; on 3 January 1956 to Hempstead, New York

Reorganized and redesigned 15 Augst 1957 as the 423d Military Police Guard Company

Inactivated 1 July 1959 at Hempstead, New York

Redesignated 22 February 1972 as the 423d Military Police Company and activated at Hempstead, New York

Ordered into active military service 16 August 1980 at Hempstead, New York; released from active military service 30 August 1980 and reverted to reserve status

Location changed 17 September 2001 to Shoreham, New York.

Element ordered into active military service 5 January 2004 at Shoreham, New York; released from active military service 3 January 2005 and reverted to reserve status

Ordered into active military service 10 June 2014 at Shoreham, New York; released from active military service 14 July 2015 and reverted to reserve status Element ordered into active military service 11 May 2020 at Shoreham, New York; released from active military service 14 June 2021 and reverted to reserve status

Ordered into active military service 5 July 2024 at Shoreham, New York
