Lineage and Honors

349th QUARTERMASTER COMPANY

Organized June 1916 as Headquarters Company, 5th Infantry, California National Guard, and mustered into Federal service for Mexican border service

Mustered out of Federal service 7 October 1916 at Sacramento

Called into Federal service 26 March 1917; drafted into Federal service 5 August 1917

Consolidated 24 September - 1 November 1917 with Headquarters Company, 2d Infantry Regiment, California National Guard, and consolidated unit designated as Headquarters Company, 159th Infantry, and element of the 40th Division

Demobilized 1 May 1919 at the Presidio of San Francisco, California

Former Headquarters Company 5th Infantry Regiment, California National Guard, reorganized, and federally recognized 24 April 1922 at Oakland as Headquarters Company, 159th Infantry, and element of the 40th Division

Inducted into Federal service 3 March 1941 at Oakland

(159th Infantry relieved 29 October 1941 from assignment to the 40th Division and assigned to the 7th Division [later redesignated the 7th Motorized Division and 7th Infantry Division]; relieved 23 August 1943 from assignment to the 7th Infantry Division)

Inactivated 4 November 1945 at Camp Shanks, New York

Reorganized and Federally recognized 28 January 1947 at Alameda, as an element of the 49th Infantry Division

Reorganized and redesignated 1 May 1959 as Combat Support Company, 1st Battle Group, 159th Infantry, an element of the 49th Infantry Division

349th QUARTERMASTER COMPANY

Converted and redesignated 1 March 1963 as Company B, 249th Supply and Transport Battalion, an element of the 49th Infantry Division

Consolidated 29 January 1968 with the Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 249th Supply Company (organized and Federally recognized 4 December 1965 at Alameda), and with Company D, 749th Maintenance Battalion (see ANNEX 1) and consolidated unit redesignated as the 349th Supply and Service Company; concurrently relieved from assignment to the 49th Infantry Division

Location changed 1 March 1970 to Alameda

Location changed 1 August 1978 to Benicia

Redesignated 1 September 1990 as the 349th Quartermaster Company

Redesignated 1 September 1993 as Detachment 1, 349th Quartermaster Company and location simultaneously changed to Vallejo

Reorganized and redesignated 1 April 2000 as 349th Quartermaster Company

Ordered into active Federal service 7 February 2003 at Vallejo; released from active Federal service 19 June 2004 and reverted to state control

Ordered into active Federal service 9 June 2007 at Vallejo; released from active Federal service 12 July 2008 and reverted to state control

Ordered into active Federal service 7 July 2013 at Vallejo; released from active Federal service 10 August 2014 and reverted to state control

ANNEX 1

Organized and Federally recognized 25 April 1922 in the California National Guard as Battery D, 1st Separate Battalion of Field Artillery, at Oakland

Reorganized and redesignated 20 September 1923 as Battery D, 143d Field Artillery, an element of the 40th Division

Reorganized and redesignated 5 June 1925 as Headquarters Battery and Combat Train, 1st Battalion 143d Field Artillery

349th QUARTERMASTER COMPANY

Reorganized and redesignated 1 July 1940 as Headquarters Battery, 1st Battalion, 143d Field Artillery

Inducted into Federal service 3 March 1941 at Oakland

Reorganized and redesignated 16 February 1942 as Headquarters Battery, 143d Field Artillery Battalion, an element of the 40th Infantry Division

(143d Field Artillery Battalion relieved 1 September 1942 from assignment to the 40th Infantry Division and assigned to the 27th Infantry Division; relieved 30 October 1942 from assignment to the 27th Division and assigned to the 40th Division)

Inactivated 7 April 1946 at Camp Stoneman, California

Reorganized and Federally recognized 22 April 1947 as Headquarters Battery, 629th Field Artillery Battalion, an element of the 49th Infantry Division, at Alameda

Consolidated 1 May 1959 with the Service Battery, 629th Field Artillery Battalion (see ANNEX 2), and with the Medical Detachment, 629th Field Artillery Battalion (organized and Federally recognized 28 March 1955 at Alameda), and consolidated unit designated as Headquarters Battery, 2d Howitzer Battalion, 143d Artillery, an element of the 49th Division

Converted and redesignated 1 March 1963 as Company D, 749th Maintenance Battalion, an element of the 49th Infantry Division

ANNEX 2

Constituted in the Army of the United States as the Service Battery, 1st Battalion, 143d Field Artillery, an element of the 40th Division, and activated 20 April 1941 at Camp San Luis Obispo, California

Reorganized and redesignated 18 February 1942 as the Service Battery, 143d Field Artillery Battalion, an element of the 40th Division

(143d Field Artillery Battalion relieved 1 September 1942 from assignment to the 40th Infantry Division and assigned to the 27th Infantry Division; relieved 30 October 1942 from assignment to the 27th Division and assigned to the 40th Division)

Inactivated 7 April 1946 at Camp Stoneman, California

Allotted to the California National Guard, reorganized and Federally recognized 1 July 1947 as Service Battery, 629th Field Artillery Battalion, an element of the 49th Infantry Division, at Alameda
