146th SIGNAL BATTALION

Constituted 1 November 1952 in the Florida Army National Guard as the 748th Ordnance Battalion, assigned to the 48th Infantry Division, and organized from existing units at Jacksonville

Reorganized and redesignated 1 November 1955 as the 748th Armored Ordnance Battalion (48th Infantry Division concurrently reorganized and redesignated as the 48th Armored Division)

Reorganized and redesignated 15 April 1959 as the 748th Ordnance Battalion

Converted and redesignated 15 February 1963 as the 146th Signal Battalion and relieved from assignment to the 48th Armored Division

Ordered into active Federal service 30 January 2003 at home stations; released from active Federal service 28 January 2005 and reverted to state control

Ordered into active Federal service 5 October 2008 at home stations; released from active Federal service 5 November 2009 and reverted to state control

Ordered into active Federal service 26 March 2020 at home stations; released from active Federal service 25 March 2021 and reverted to state control
